



Encino Hills Traffic Calming Plan - FAQ

Updated 03/05/2026

1. What is the City's plan to calm traffic in the Encino Hills?

- LADOT is implementing a three-phase plan to calm traffic in the Encino Hills. LADOT will install a suite of turn restrictions and other signage options for the Encino Hills with the goal of reducing the overall flow of cut-through traffic in the neighborhood, specifically near Hayvenhurst/Calneva and Sepulveda Blvd.
- Phase 1 began in March 2026, with a Tactical Trial of targeted turn restrictions.
- Phase 2 will study the impact and effectiveness of these turn restrictions.
- Phase 3 will involve the installation of speed mitigation measures, such as speed humps/tables, gateway treatments (similar to those at Escalon Dr/Hayvenhurst), medians, and other treatments.

2. What prompted the City and Council District 4 to take action?

- Cut-through traffic has worsened significantly over the past decade with the increased usage of GPS navigation apps such as Google Maps and Waze, which have increasingly routed traffic through the Encino Hills. Encino Hills residents have advocated for measures to reduce the flow of traffic and implement traffic safety measures in the neighborhood, and in 2021 residents successfully advocated with Council District 5 to secure \$50k in funding set aside for traffic mitigation in the Encino Hills.
- When Council District 4 was redrawn to include Encino during redistricting, the CD4 team looked into reports from the Encino Neighborhood Council (ENC) and the Encino Property Owners Association (EPOA) that the \$50,000 had been exhausted. What we found instead was that there was \$150,000 in neighborhood traffic calming funds available for the Encino Hills, and only the Encino Hills, from development mitigation fees.
- With the continued advocacy from residents and the ENC and the EPOA, CD4 solicited advice from LADOT. The department advised that the neighborhood traffic calming funding could be used to implement a multi-phase traffic calming plan, with CD4 and LADOT jointly managing the outreach and planning efforts. The resulting community engagement process has involved

a [survey](#) filled out by hundreds of Encino residents, traffic data collection and analysis by LADOT, and numerous [presentations](#) to community groups including the Encino Neighborhood Council, Encino Property Owners Association, and Lanai Rd Elementary stakeholders.

3. When will the traffic calming plan go into effect?

- After a one-week delay due to signage issues, the Tactical Trial of turn restrictions went into effect in March 2026. The trial will last for at least one year, though this is subject to change.

4. What are the turn restrictions?

- The turn restrictions are in effect on weekday mornings during peak hours only – from 7-10am – and consist of right turn and left turn restrictions, depending on the location. The turn restrictions will be in effect at intersections in the Encino Hills selected to inhibit cut-through traffic headed to Hayvenhurst/Calneva or Sepulveda Blvd. Additionally, “No Right-Turn on Red” signs have been posted at three Eastbound intersections on Ventura Blvd: Woodley, Firmament, and Petit.

5. Will the navigation apps be informed of the new turn restrictions?

- Yes. LADOT will work with the relevant GPS apps to ensure the turn restrictions are observed. If you notice an issue with a navigation app, this can be reported directly to the app, as well as to encinohillstraffic@lacity.org.

6. What happens if the traffic calming plan doesn't work as intended?

- During the Tactical Trial, Council District 4 and LADOT will collect feedback from residents via an [online survey](#). Additionally, LADOT is working to collect on-the-ground traffic data during the Tactical Trial period. This will inform the next steps the City will pursue in Phase 3 of the traffic calming project.

7. Why are the turn restrictions only in effect for the morning rush hour, and not the evening?

- The 2023 survey and 2024 traffic data counts revealed that the morning rush hour was the greatest concern for Encino residents. In consultation with the Encino Neighborhood Council, CD4 and LADOT made the decision to conduct the tactical trial for the 7am-10am window.

8. I live in the Encino Hills and my street has a turn restriction. Do I have to follow this turn restriction, even if I live in the neighborhood?

- Yes. In the State of California, turn restrictions on public streets legally must apply to all vehicles, regardless of residency. Residents may have to take a different and less convenient route during the weekday morning peak hours of 7-10am when the turn restrictions are in effect.

9. How do I contact Council District 4 and LADOT to give feedback about the project?
